One of my favorite saints is St. Mary Magdalene. Her feast day is celebrated on July 22, which makes it just a little awkward to feature her in the August Newsletter, but we do not publish a July newsletter at Trinity, and I always feel that we miss something by not talking about her.

If there is one saint that anybody can connect with, if there is one saint that anybody can emulate, it is Saint Mary Magdalene. Mary Magdalene is heroic in two ways; first that she receives Jesus' grace so freely and abundantly, and second that she abounds in gratitude and stubborn faithfulness to Jesus. We know of no churches that she established (though there are reliable stories that she journeyed to Ethiopia and less reliable stories that she journeyed to England with the Holy Grail...), there are no records of resurrections or glorious miracles that are attributed to her. Mary Magdalene is a most human, a most ordinary saint.

Because she is so...ordinary, Mary Magdalene is accessible to all of us as an example of what Jesus can do for us and how a simple life of discipleship might look to us. Jesus heals Mary Magdalene through the forgiveness of her sins, and in return she adores and seeks to be closer to Jesus. She ventures to the tomb, seeking only to anoint our Lord's body and in return meets the Risen Lord, whom she does not recognize. She hastens back to the apostles with a message that all of us should be able to say: "I have seen the Lord!" This is a journey we take every Sunday morning, where we gather, confess our sins and hear them absolved, listen to our Lord's Word in the Scriptures and preaching, come to the table, and are sent out to a hungry world with the God News – We have seen the Lord!

Saint Mary Magdalene, called "The Apostle to the Apostles" by Bernard of Clairvaux, carried the Good News of the resurrection of our Lord back to the eleven apostles (minus Judas). Whenever the gospels list the women who followed Jesus, Mary Magdalene is mentioned first. The Gospel of Luke reports that Jesus had cured her of seven demons. She is often linked with the unnamed woman of the city who anoints Jesus' feet with ointment and tears, and then dries them with her hair. The Biblical witness however does not explicitly make this connection. Nor, apparently, is Mary Magdalene the same figure as Mary of Bethany (sister of Martha and Lazarus).

According to the Gospels, Mary of Magdala is the first and primary witness of the fundamental facts of the Christian faith: she was present at the crucifixion, death, and burial of Jesus and she is the first to see the Resurrection of our Lord. She is called by name and sent with a message like the other apostles, hence the honorific title. This fact is seen by many as a definitive example of Jesus opening the apostolic ministry (ordination) to women as well as men. It should be also noted that her initial report is disbelieved by those who heard it, reminding us that the Christian message must be proclaimed with confidence no matter whether it is met with joy or skepticism.

Mary Magdalene has been seen as the patroness of all the penitent sinners, owing to the linking of this Mary to the exorcism of the seven demons, but also to the linking of this Mary to the repentant "woman of the city" who has traditionally been seen as a prostitute. Either way, Mary Magdalene is a powerful witness of discipleship, remaining steadfast to Jesus throughout his trial and death when all the other apostles flee and deny him. She is also the embodiment of Christian hope, watching and keeping vigil in the face of death and the grave, and so is granted the privilege of being the first to witness our Lord's resurrection.

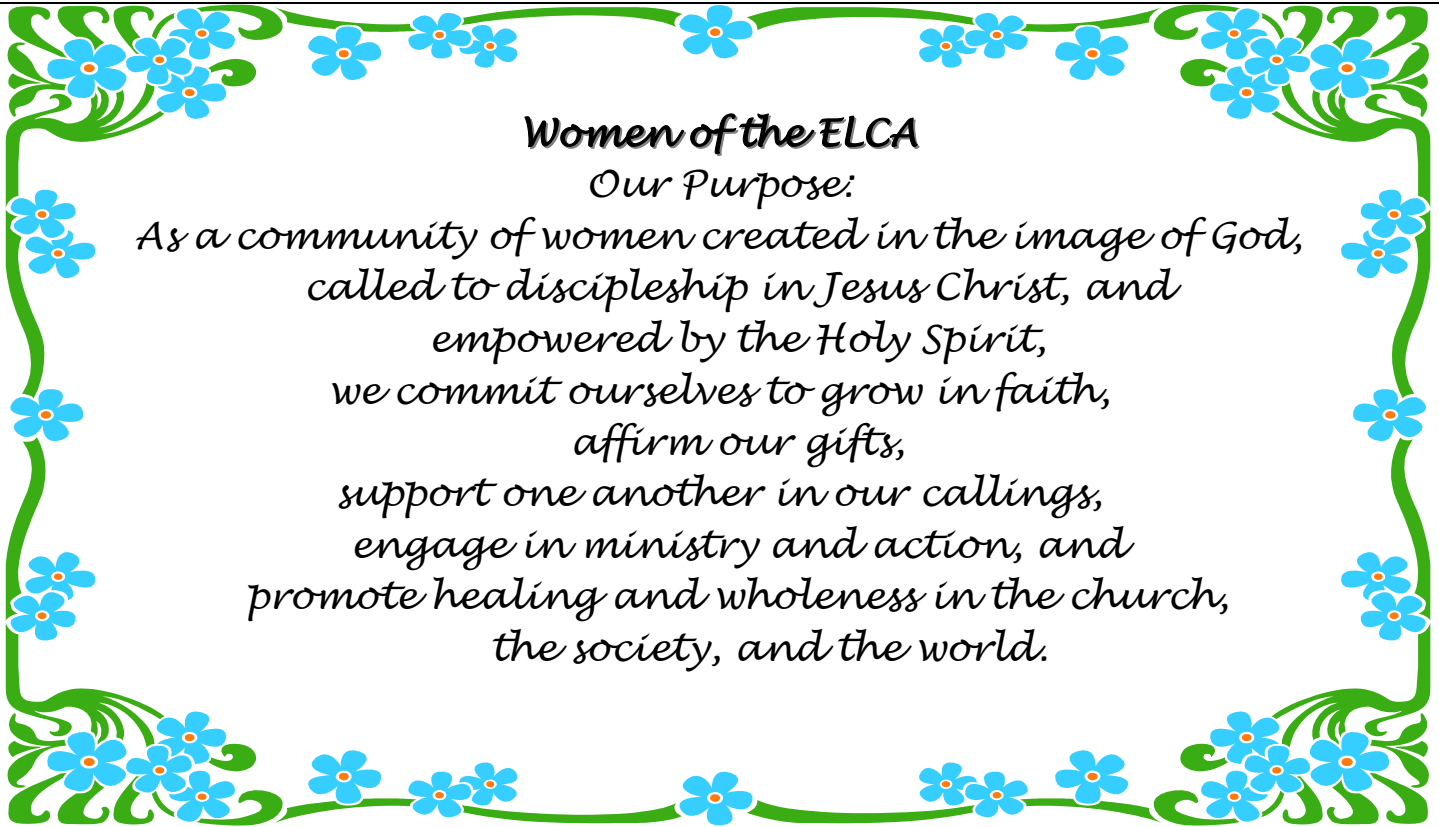

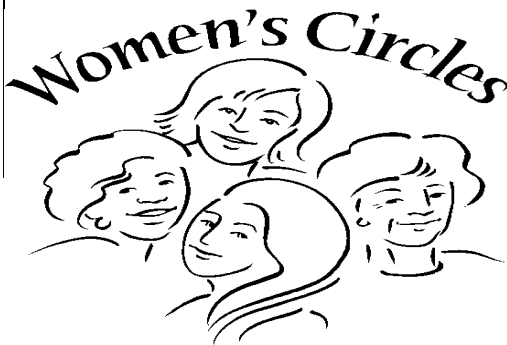

## **Convention Sets the Stage for "Renew, Respond, Rejoice!"**

### **Newly elected president of Women of the ELCA**

Spokane has been put on notice! The Holy Spirit now resides at the Spokane Convention Center and Women of the ELCA is here in the form of spiritually powerful women. We have been welcomed by Bishop Martin Wells of Eastern Washington-Idaho Synod, and we joined Bishop Jessica Crist from the Montana Synod in our opening worship. Bishop Crist encouraged us to be fully present during our business sessions because "it matters!"

The opening of the convention sets the stage as we begin to live out our gathering theme this week, "Renew, Respond, Rejoice!" Now, I know what you are thinking ... how could plenary business sessions during a convention be the harbinger of the kind of spiritual centeredness that resonates within our gathering theme? However, I want you to consider what this theme is really calling us to do.

We are called to "Renew." Delegates have traveled from 64 different synodical women's organizations. They left their families, jobs and daily responsibilities in order to invest themselves in the renewal of our organization. This rekindling comes in the form of memorials, resolutions and constitutional amendments. But it also comes in connections, conversations and commitments that bind us together for another triennium. This renewal is an essential component of the success of our organization.

We are called to "Respond." During this convention, 21 women (myself included) were called to leadership for this organization by serving on the churchwide executive board for the next three years. Through the affirmation of the voting body, these women have been asked to serve faithfully to support the vision and future of this organization. And they responded with a resounding "YES!"

We are called to "Rejoice!" While I admit that some of the delegates may want to rejoice that the plenary sessions are finally at an end, all the delegates should celebrate and rejoice that we worked diligently to make every voice heard. By faithfully committing ourselves to this work, we have reaffirmed the mission and purpose of Women of the ELCA.

Now, in the gathering, our sisters in Christ will join the delegates along with special guests and speakers for a time of renewing our spirits, responding to God's call and rejoicing in fellowship with one another. But, looking back at the triennial convention and what it will mean for the next triennium, I can most assuredly say that we, as delegates to the Eighth Triennial Convention of Women of the ELCA, have gotten a head start on the celebration!

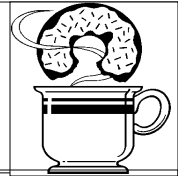


**Men's Breakfast**

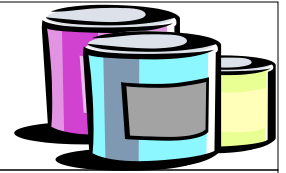

## ON-GOING MINISTRY

In each monthly newsletter there is usually included a list of the needs of various agencies in our area such as the Gabriel Project, Covenant House, and the Food Pantry. You may sometimes ask yourself "when do I have time to take my donations to these different places, where exactly are these various agencies located, and what hours might they be open to accept donations?" Those are very good questions, and Trinity's Social Ministry Committee has the answers! To make it easier for Trinity's members to donate to the many needs of these local groups, there is a collection box in the Church foyer. At the end of the month, the Committee will deliver all of the donated items.

### Food Pantry Needs

Donations are welcome in the Food Pantry. The food pantry is in need of any type of grain items such as cereal, macaroni and cheese, and plain macaroni. Canned fruit and vegetables, and canned meats, pasta sauce, and peanut butter are also appreciated. Canned soup is especially needed right now.



### The Gabriel Project

Please bring in new or used onesies, sleepers, socks, and receiving blankets. Also, diapers, baby food, and baby toiletries are always needed. Similac Sensitive Formula is particularly needed.

Trinity's Table served 2,400 meals from May 1 to July 10, an average of 200 meals each night. The number of meals we are serving has been growing all summer long. We have not served less than 200 meals any night for the last seven weeks.

Because of donations of money and food from many members of Trinity and people from the community, we have been able to keep our costs extremely low. Our total expenditure for food for this time period is \$1,437.40. For 2400 meals, that works out to an average of 60¢ a meal! And year to date, we've served 5,219 meals at a cost of \$3,372.12, or 65¢ a meal. This low cost is especially astonishing considering that Feeding America statistics show that an average meal in West Virginia costs \$2.42. And they have been quality meals: a recent menu included barbecued ribs, baked barbecued chicken, creamed corn, fresh cucumbers, watermelon, and brownies with ice cream.

We are extremely blessed by numerous volunteers from Trinity every Sunday, as well as many volunteers from outside of Trinity. We are very grateful for all who give of their time and their resources to help support this ministry. We have a great time every Sunday, and invite you to come join us!

The following information, taken from Feeding America's website, provides some very enlightening information about the face of the hungry in America, the working poor. These are the folks who constitute a large percentage of the guests we serve every Sunday at Trinity's Table.

### Working Poor

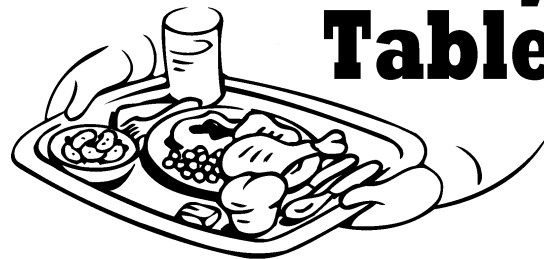
One of the most common misconceptions is the assumption that if someone is hungry, that means they do not have a job and are living on the streets. What most people don't understand is that anyone can experience hunger. It is a silent epidemic that affects more than 49 million Americans.

According to the US Census Bureau, in 2008, 19 million people lived in working-poor families. This translates into nearly 9 percent of all American families living below 100 percent of poverty have at least one family member working. In fact, 36 percent of client households served by the Feeding America network have one or more adults working.

#### Working Poor Facts

- Female-headed households were more than twice as likely to be among the working poor as male-headed households in 2008.
- Married-couple families with children under 18 were almost 5 times as likely as families without children to be among the working poor in 2008.
- Among families with at least one member working at least half a year, families with children were 4 times more likely than families without children to live in poverty in 2008.
- According to a survey on hunger and homelessness conducted by the United States Conference of Mayors, 92% of cities participating in the survey cited unemployment as one of three major causes of hunger in their city.
- Thirty-nine percent of all adult clients served by Feeding America have completed high school or equivalent degree with no further education beyond high school.
- Thirty-four percent of all client households served by Feeding America have had to choose between paying for food and paying for medicine or medical care.
- Sixty-five percent of working families that received SNAP were single-parent families.

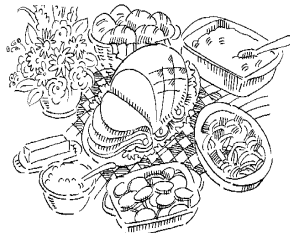


**HANDBELL NEWS**

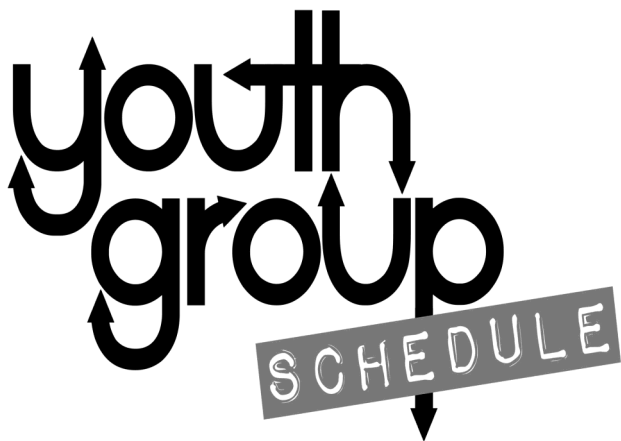
**Friendly Lutheran News**

**FOOD PANTRY NEWS**

The Food Pantry is experiencing unprecedented numbers this summer. As you can see from the chart below, it's no wonder we have had a hard time keeping enough food in the pantry to meet our needs. We served 859 people during the month of June. Records that date back five years show we have never served this many clients. The previous high was 725. Following is a break down of the numbers this year compared to last year:

Families	120	106	+13.21%
Total	859	694	+23.78%

The continued support from Trinity's family is much appreciated. Because of the increased numbers, we are experiencing weekly shortages. Any donations of macaroni and cheese, pasta, rice, dried beans (smaller packages rather than larger), spaghetti sauce, boxed dinner mixes, peanut butter, jelly, cereal, canned soup, canned tuna, instant potatoes, ramen noodles, canned chili, spaghetti-os hamburger helper, and instant stuffing are much appreciated and needed.
